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GOALS OF THE STUDY

- to use available survey data to describe characteristics of welfare families that are relevant to the Family Support Act (FSA)
- to determine what the characteristics of welfare families imply for the implementation of the FSA and efforts to break the cycle of poverty
- to provide benchmark data that will permit an appraisal of the effects of the FSA in the future

- All families with children
- Families below official poverty line that have not received welfare in past year (poor, non-welfare families)
- Families at or above official poverty line (non-poor families)
- · Women who have not (yet) had children (non-mothers)

SELECTED FINDINGS

-DEMOGRAPHIC-

WELFARE FAMILIES ARE SMALLER THAN GENERALLY BELIEVED

- mean number of children in AFDC families with children 0.17 = 2.50
- mean for non-poor families = 2.38
- 63% of AFDC families have only 1 or 2 children
- 14% have 4 or more children

· MAJORITY OF WELFARE FAMILIES BEGAN WITH A TEEN BIRTH

- 59% of AFDC mothers were 19 or younger at birth of first child
- 13% were 24 or older
- 25% of non-poor mothers were 19 or younger at birth of first child
- 41% were 24 or older

• AT LEAST HALF OF WELFARE MOTHERS WERE NEVER MARRIED TO FATHER OF THE CHILD

- same true of only 5% of non-poor mothers

SELECTED FINDINGS

-EMPLOYMENT-RELATED-

- EDUCATION LEVELS OF WELFARE MOTHERS ARE HIGHER THAN GENERALLY BELIEVED, BUT STILL COMPARATIVELY LOW
 - majority of AFDC mothers with children 0-17 have completed high school or GED
 - 13% have some college education
 - 46% of AFDC mothers have not finished high school
 - same true of only 13% of non-poor mothers
- PERFORMANCE OF WELFARE MOTHERS ON ACADEMIC TESTS
 IS WELL BELOW AVERAGE
 - on IQ-type scale, mean score of AFDC mothers aged 22-30 on Armed Forces Qualifying Test = 86
 - mean of non-poor mothers = 99
 - mean of non-mothers = 104
 - 47% of AFDC mothers score more than one standard deviation below overall mean
 - 23% score at or above mean
 - most would not qualify for U.S. Armed Forces

EMPLOYMENT-RELATED FINDINGS (continued)

- MOST WELFARE MOTHERS HAVE HAD SOME WORK EXPERIENCE, BUT NOT MUCH
 - mean number of weeks worked in last 5 years by AFDC mothers aged 22-30 = 59
 - 20% worked 2 years or more
 - mean weeks worked by non-poor mothers = 155
 - 71% worked 2 years or more
- MOST WOMEN WITH CHILDREN AGED 3-5 ARE IN LABOR FORCE, BUT ONLY A MINORITY OF AFDC MOTHERS ARE
 - 59% of non-poor mothers with children aged 3-5 are currently employed
 - 3% are looking for work
 - 21% of mothers with children aged 3-5 who have received AFDC in past year are currently employed
 - 11% are looking for work

HOME ENVIRONMENTS IN WHICH

AFDC CHILDREN ARE RAISED

- MAJORITY ARE IN HOMES THAT PROVIDE LITTLE INTELLEC-TUAL STIMULATION
 - 66% of AFDC children aged 3-5 are in families that score low on "HOME Scale," an index of parental practices that correlate with school achievement
 - Only 42% have mothers who read to them 3 times a week or more
 - 55% are in homes where TV is on 7 hours a day or more

NON-WELFARE POOR FAMILIES ALSO PROVIDE RELATIVELY LITTLE INTELLECTUAL STIMULATION TO THEIR CHILDREN

HEALTH-RELATED ASPECTS OF

HOME ENVIRONMENT

 BOTH AFDC AND NON-WELFARE POOR FAMILIES COME OUT BADLY ON INDICATORS OF HEALTH PROMOTION AND INJURY PREVENTION

- 56% of AFDC children (ages 0-17) have adult smoker in household
- same is true of 50% of non-welfare poor children, versus 39% of non-poor children
- 45% of AFDC children do not use seat belts regularly
- same is true of 44 percent of non-welfare poor
- 27% of non-poor children don't use seat belts

ACCESS TO MEDICAL CARE

• WELFARE CHILDREN COME OUT SIGNIFICANTLY BETTER THAN NON-WELFARE POOR CHILDREN ON INDICATORS OF ACCESS TO PREVENTIVE CARE

- 64% of AFDC children (ages 3-17) have seen a dentist in last 12 months
- Only 47% of non-welfare poor have had dental care within year
- 74% of non-poor children have had dental care
- Twice as many non-welfare poor children have not seen a doctor in 2 years or more:

-13% of non-AFDC poor children (ages 0-17)

-6% of AFDC children

-8% of non-poor children

DEVELOPMENT AND WELL-BEING

OF AFDC CHILDREN

 WELFARE CHILDREN ARE SIGNIFICANTLY LESS HEALTHY THAN NON-POOR CHILDREN

- 39% of AFDC children rated in "Excellent" health, versus 57% of non-poor children so rated
- 7% of AFDC children in "Fair" or "Poor" health, versus only 2% of non-poor children
- WELFARE CHILDREN ARE TWICE AS LIKELY TO FAIL IN SCHOOL
 - By teen years (ages 12-17), 36% of AFDC teens have repeated a grade
 - 17% of non-poor teens have repeated

DEVELOPMENT AND WELL-BEING

OF AFDC CHILDREN (continued)

- WELFARE CHILDREN ARE MORE LIKELY TO PRESENT SERIOUS CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE PROBLEMS
 - 23% of AFDC teens have been suspended or expelled from school at least once
 - 10% of non-poor teens have ever been suspended or expelled

• NON-WELFARE POOR CHILDREN SHOW ABOUT SAME LEVEL OF HEALTH, LEARNING AND BEHAVIOR PROBLEMS AS AFDC CHILDREN

IMPLICATIONS FOR FAMILY SUPPORT ACT

DIVERSITY OF AFDC POPULATION CREATES LIKELIHOOD OF DIFFERENTIAL IMPACTS

- Obvious possibilities for "creaming" by state programs

- Greatest opportunity for constructive change may lie in that segment of the AFDC parent population that falls between those who are readily employable and those who present formidable challenges to employment

- CONCERN THAT FSA WILL CONVERT WELFARE POOR INTO WORKING POOR
- SUGGESTION THAT WELFARE-TO-WORK PROGRAMS SHOULD AIM AT PREPARING AFDC MOTHERS FOR NON-TRADITIONAL, BLUE-COLLAR TRADES
- NEED FOR PARENTING EDUCATION, FAMILY LITERACY, OR HIGH-QUALITY CHILD CARE TO COMPENSATE FOR DEFICIENCIES IN HOME ENVIRONMENTS OF AFDC CHILDREN
- DATA SUPPORT CONCERNS ABOUT POSSIBLE NEGATIVE EFFECTS ON CHILDREN'S HEALTH CARE OF LOSS OF MEDICAID BENEFITS
